IT TAKES ENERGY TO DO GOD'S WILL

"Lord, when doubts fill my mind, when my heart is in turmoil, quiet me and give me renewed hope and cheer" (Psalm 94:19 LB).

The fact is it takes energy to do God's will. What do you do when you run out of energy?

God suggests when we're feeling uneasy, perhaps low on energy; we should be still and get quiet before him: "Lord, when doubts fill my mind, when my heart is in turmoil, quiet me and give me renewed hope and cheer" (Psalm 94:19 LB).

But many of us have trouble getting quiet. It's as if we are afraid of silence; it makes us very uncomfortable. The moment we get in the car, the radio or CD player goes on. The moment we get home, the TV goes on.

Yet, God, in a sense, says, "If you want to lower your stress, it's as simple as this: Shut up. Be silent. Stop talking and start listening."

I suggest that once a day you should go out in your backyard, sit down, and just be quiet. I'm not talking about reading your Bible. You ought to read your Bible every day, but I mean be alone for five minutes a day and be completely silent. Ask God a question, and then just sit and listen.

Sometimes we say, "God, I really need your guidance on this," and then we get up and walk off. We don't wait for an answer. Could it be the reason we never hear from God is we never listen?

Learn to take little mini-breaks during the day. When you feel your blood pressure rising, stop and say, "God, I want to tune in on you again. I want to focus in on you." I'm not suggesting thirty minutes of meditation. I'm talking about fifteen or twenty seconds. Just little mini-breaks to stop and be quiet.

Why is this important? Because the race of life is tough and, quite honestly, it's tough to live God's plan for your life. It's important to be still and know He is there.

Here's an easy formula I use: Divert daily, withdraw weekly, abandon annually. Get quiet once a day, take one day a week to rest, and always take some sort of vacation at least once a year.

Blessings as you reveal Jesus in 2023.

A LEVEL HIGHER THROUGH HIS LEADING



Navesau Adventist High School in Fiji, once again performed commendably in the 2022 Fiji Year 13 External Examination. While the school was targeting a 100% pass rate, we praised the Lord for the 84.6% pass rate achieved. This was the same pass rate achieved in 2022, state principal Mr Qalobula.

Mr Qalobula thank the teachers for their tireless effort in preparing the students to represent God's school in the External Examinations. He also thanks the tremendous support given by the parents for partnering with the school to ensure there is vibrant to the 2022 school theme, "A level higher through Hisleading". All glory and honor belong to God.

The new Coalition government in Fiji, with its new policy that it will respect the management of faith-based schools, have opened up the door for the Fiji Mission administrators to negotiate with the Ministry of Education for Navesau to receive the Free Education Grant (FEG) and for the teachers to be paid by the government. The Ministry of Education have agreed to release the Term 1 FEG and include teachers' salary in the new 2023/2024 national budget.

The previous government withheld the FEG for Navesau when the school was privatized in 2019 and Fiji Mission has to pay for the teachers.

The Navesau, 2023 school roll, has increased in an amazing way. From a roll of 221 in 2022, our current roll is 267 and there are still 3 from PNG, 7 from Vanuatu and 1 from Kiribati students who have been sent Acceptance Letters from Navesau and are still yet to arrive.

While we rejoice at the opportunity to access government funding for Navesau, I pray that in reengaging with the government, Navesau will not end up diluting the special character and ethos of Adventist Education. - Josua Qalobula (Principal)

Atoifi Adventist College of Nursing, an Affiliated campus of Pacific Adventist University, PNG has witnessed the 5th graduation since the Nursing degree program was introduced in 2015.

This February graduation is special in that it should have taken place last year in December. However, due

to the Covid crisis and riot in Honiara last year, students were not able to complete their clinical requirements until early February this year.

The highlight of the weekend was the graduation of the 21 students. For the first time in history, a number of students have scored distinction and credit as announced by the school principal in his speech.

The graduation was also graced with the presence and address of the deputy Director of the Nursing Council from the Ministry of Health and Medical Services- Mr. George Pego. In his remarks he highlighted the good work of the school in meeting the requirements of the Nursing Council by producing quality graduates who have performed outstanding work in the clinics and hospitals around the country.

Of the 21 graduates, two were overseas students from Vanuatu and Kiribati. Half of the graduates were sponsored by their governments. The other half were supported by their parents and private donors like Julia and Chapman of Australia.

With the increase in demand of nurses both locally and overseas, the church through SPD has funded the constructions of the new boys and girls' dormitories. The completion of the dormitories will see the increase in the number of students studying in the campus.




